LESSON THREE: DAY ONE

God's Forever Family

Can you imagine the emotional state of a child who does not know from day to day whether or not he is a member of the family? Today, since he was a good boy, he is considered a member. But tomorrow, if he misbehaves, he may no longer be a member. Today, he is loved by his father. Tomorrow he may not be. This child would be a neurotic mess.

You are a part of your family, regardless of your behavior. So it is in the family of God, too. If you belong to Christ, you are part of the family, and can enjoy the emotional security our Heavenly Father wants us to experience.

Jesus said, "My sheep hear my voice, and I know them, and they follow me: and I give unto them eternal life; and they shall never perish, neither shall any man pluck them out of my hand. My Father, who gave them to me, is greater than all; and no man is able to pluck them out of my Father's hand" (John 10:27-29).

God's Engagement Ring

Ephesians 1:13-14 says that the Holy Spirit has been given to us as a deposit, guaranteeing our inheritance as God's children. The word translated as "deposit" is the same word used when a man promised to marry a woman. The Spirit is a promise-and God always keeps his promises!

LESSON THREE: DAY TWO

He Who Began...

God will complete what He has begun. In Philippians 1:6, Paul says, "Being confident of this very thing, that He who has begun a good work in you will complete it until the day of Jesus Christ."

When you were saved, who began the good work in you? It was God. He was the One who called you. The Holy Spirit showed you that you were a sinner in need of salvation. He convicted you of your sin and converted you by helping you understand the Gospel. He was the One who put faith in your heart and helped you receive the Lord Jesus Christ.

But He is not just the Convictor or the Convertor; He is also the Completor. He never starts anything that He does not intend to finish. There is no job that proves too big for Him. He has begun a good work in your life, and He intends to complete it. If any of His children were to perish apart from Him, that would mean God had been defeated in His purpose.

The fact is, God *will* persevere in the lives of His children, and complete the good work He has begun.

LESSON THREE: DAY THREE

Your Destiny Is Determined

Read Romans 8:29-30. What do the following mean?

For whom He foreknew, He also predestined to be conformed to the image of His Son, that He might be the first-born among many brethren. Moreover whom He predestined, these He also called; whom He called, these He also justified; and whom He justified, these He also glorified. (Romans 8:29–30)

The Bible says God foreknew certain ones and predestined them to be like Jesus. That is, He predetermined their destiny. He planned out what was going to happen to them. If you are predestined for heaven, then you'll be in heaven and you will be like the Lord Jesus. You couldn't be in hell and be like Jesus Christ.

That passage in Romans offers a chain of five golden links: foreknowledge, predestination, calling, justification, and glorification. If you are a child of God, He already sees you glorified. He already pictures you in heaven. It doesn't say that some day He will glorify you, but that you are already glorified. Your salvation did not begin with you. It began before the creation of the World.

God knew you were going to be born, and He already had a plan for you to be with Him. He sees you predestined for heaven, being like His Son Jesus Christ. What could possibly stop that? How could you ever lose your salvation if you are predestined to be like Christ? What is settled in eternity cannot be undone in time. What has been decreed by heaven cannot be annulled by hell.

Noah's Ark-A Picture of Our Salvation

How safe was Noah when it began to rain? Noah was as safe as the ark. He may have fallen down inside the ark, but he never fell out. He couldn't because God sealed him in. Not only did God seal Noah in the ark, but He sealed the water out.

The believer is in Jesus as Noah was in the ark. He is sealed into Jesus by the Holy Spirit and not one drop of Judgment can get to those who are in Jesus, the Ark of Safety.

LESSON THREE: DAY FOUR

"I Never Knew You"

When we look at the issue of eternal security, we must first define our terms. Eternal security is for believers, people who have received Jesus Christ into their hearts by faith. They are born again, having become partakers of the divine nature. This person can never again be a lost soul.

Now, we have all known people who were apparently saved, but no longer have any interest in spiritual things. They used to attend church—maybe they were even baptized—and they seemed to be Christians. But I would argue that they never were truly saved. These are the ones Jesus spoke about in Matthew 7:22–23 when He said, "Many will say to me in that day, 'Lord, Lord, have we not prophesied in Your name, cast our demons in Your name, and done many wonders in Your name?' And then I will declare to them, 'I never knew you; depart from Me you who practice lawlessness."

Notice that Jesus doesn't say, "I once knew you, but you lost it." He says He never knew them. They may have done all sorts of religious things, but they never knew God. They turned away from Him at some point, and they do not have eternal life.

Every church has experienced plenty of people who are baptized, join as members, and seem to live for God awhile, but then turn away. They were never saved. If they left the faith and stayed away, we can be sure they were never saved. That's the message John gives us in 1 John 2:19: "They went out from us, but they were not of us; for if they had been of us, they would no doubt have continued with us."

If these folks had really been Christians, they would have remained in the faith. They didn't lose their salvation—they never had it!

LESSON THREE: DAY FIVE

Kept by His Power

Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who according to His abundant mercy has begotten us again to a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, to an inheritance incorruptible and undefiled and that does not fade away, reserved in heaven for you, who are kept by the power of God through faith for salvation ready to be revealed in the last time. (I Peter 1:3-5)

We are kept by the power of God. There is no power which can force open God's hand and pluck us out of it. If Satan could do it, he surely would have. God saved us from the power of Satan. He also saved us from the power of ourselves, for John 10:28 promises that "they shall never perish" which literally translated means, "they can never destroy themselves."

The Good Shepherd takes care of us, His sheep. We are kept secure by the power of God. We can rejoice that we are eternally secure in the hands of a God who loves us.
